Government passes new law for partial check payments and removing jail time for bounced checks

Individuals and businesses can settle outstanding balances through installment plans

fter years of deliberation, the government has officially approved significant amendments to its Commercial Law, addressing the issue of "checks without sufficient funds."

The new law, which was passed by the government to the legislative authorities, aims to streamline check payments and reduce the risk of financial hardship for individuals and businesses.

The new law introduces a system of partial check payments, allowing individuals and businesses to pay off outstanding balances in installments.

This eliminates the previous practice of imprisonment for bouncing checks, a measure that was widely criticised for its harshness. The Central Bank of Bahrain, which initially proposed the complete removal of jail time for bouncing checks, has now agreed to a more nuanced approach. completely abolish the possibility of imprisonment, it significantly reduces its likelihood by
