♦ European Commission head Ursula von der Leyen will visit Kviv today for talks with Ukraine's President Volodymyr Zelensky, an EU spokesman said. "The visit will focus on all the dimensions of our relations with Ukraine," spokesman Eric Mamer told reporters on Monday, reaffirming "the EU's unwavering support towards the country". The trip will mark the fifth time von der Leyen has visited the Ukrainian capital since Russia's all out invasion of the country in February last year. Such visits, to a city that comes under frequent Russian missile strikes, are

conducted amid tight security and Mamer would reveal no precise details of the programme. "You will, of course have noticed as well this visit will take place on Europe Day," Mamer said, referring the annual celebration of European unity timed to mark the end of World War II on the continent. crashed onto a house in India on Monday, police said. "Pilot has been rescued safely. The MiG crashed on a house. Two people have died. Three people have been injured," police officer Sudhir Chaudhary told AFP after the crash in the western state of Rajasthan. The Indian Air Force (IAF) confirmed the accident and that the pilot ejected. "A MiG-21 aircraft of the IAF crashed near Suratgarh during a routine training sortie today morning," the IAF tweeted. "The pilot ejected safely, sustaining minor injuries. An inquiry has been constituted to ascertain the cause of the accident." Russian-made MiG-21 jets first entered Indian service in the 1960s and for decades served as the backbone of At least 7 killed the country's air force.

◆ At least seven people were killed Sunday outside Texas in south Texas and several others injured when a car plowed through a group waiting at a bus stop outside a migrant aid center, police said. Law enforcement said they were treating the incident as an accident for now, though a witness told AFP the driver had yelled insults at the group before accelerating. The gray sport utility vehicle "went through a red light and ran over several people" at around 8:30 am (1330 GMT) in Brownsville, a border city at the southernmost tip of the

Tran has charged two more ac-Ltresses for violating the country's dress code for women, the latest in a series of similar indictments against celebrities in the Islamic republic, local media reported yesterday.

Separate legal cases against Baran Kosari, 37, and Shaghayegh Dehghan, 44 -- both known for roles in Iranian cinema -- were filed after they appeared in public without headscarves in recent days, according to media reports.

If prosecuted, the actresses could face fines or prison terms.

Kosari's case was "sent to the judiciary" after she attended the funeral of actor Hesam Mahmoudi without a headscarf on Friday, Tasnim news agency said.

"Her photos were immediately published on the internet and some media," the news agency added. Dehghan was similarly charged for "not wearing a hijab in a cafe", Mehr news agency reported Monday.

Taiwan in talks for \$500 mn weapons package from US: defence minister

Taiwan is expecting a fast-tracked \$500 million weapons package from Washington this year to make up for delays in arms procurements, the island's defence minister said vesterday. The United States in September approved the Taiwan Policy Act -- which would see new legislation provide billions in military aid to Taipei.

"The use of the \$500 million package is aimed at prioritising supplying us with spot goods (available for immediate delivery) over any delay or late delivery in our arms procurement," Chiu told lawmakers when questioned in parliament about the "military aid" package. he United States has for decades sold weapons to Taiwan.
