Warm water melts weak spots on Antarctica's 'Doomsday Glacier,' say scientists

Scientists studying Antarcti-ca's vast Thwaites Glacier - nicknamed the Doomsday Glacier - say warm water is seeping into its weak spots, worsening melting caused by rising temperatures, two papers published in Nature journal showed.

Thwaites, which is roughly the size of Florida, represents more than half a meter (1.6 feet) of global sea level rise potential, and could destabilize neighbouring glaciers that have the potential to cause a further three-meter (9.8-foot) rise.
