### Libya urged to reschedule presidential vote 'swiftly'

♦ The US and four European powers on Friday urged war-torn



Libya to quickly set a new date for delayed presidential elections. In a joint statement, they urged the North African country's leaders to "swiftly" name a new date and issue the final list of presidential candidates, which had been a key point of contention in the run-up to the polls that were set for Friday. "We call on the relevant

Libyan authorities to respect the aspirations of the Libyan people for prompt elections," said Britain, France, Germany, Italy and the United States..

#### Mali's government has Mali denies deployment of denied any deployment of **Russian mercenaries** Russian mercenaries from the Wagner group following charges by a group of 15 Western powers involved in the fight against jihadists in the Sahel country. The government "gives a formal denial to these baseless allegations" of "an alleged deployment of elements from a private security company in Mali." it said

in a statement released late Friday. Mali's government "demands that proof be brought to it by independent sources" and said "Russian trainers" were in Mali as part of strengthening the operational capacity of the national defence and security forces.

#### Court sentences two Mexican army officers to 30 years for femicide

◆ A court in the southern Mexican state of Chiapas has

sentenced two army officers to 30 years in prison for femicide over the killing a female soldier, the state attorney general's office said. In addition to handing down the jail terms, the court ordered the army captains to each pay a fine of almost 520,000 pesos (\$25,194) for killing the 28-year-old woman in April 2019, according to the attorney general's office.

South Africa objects to auction of Nelson Mandela's cell key

OVD-Info - which has, for years, documented anti-Kremlin protests and provides legal support to victims of political persecution - said yesterday that the Roskomnadzor media regulator had moved to restrict access to its site earlier this week.

# More than 30 killed, bodies burnt in Myanmar's Kayah state

m ore\ than\ 30\ people,\ including\ women\ and\ chil-}$ dren, were killed and their bodies burnt in Myanmar's conflict-torn Kayah state on Friday, according to a local resident, media reports and a local human rights group.

Karenni Human Rights Group said they found the burnt bodies of internally displaced people, including elders, women and children killed by the military that rules Myanmar, near Mo So village of Hpruso town vesterday.

The Myanmar military said it had shot and killed an unspecified number of "terrorists with weapons" from the opposition armed forces in the village, state media said. The people were in seven vehicles and did not stop for the military, it said.

Photos shared by the human rights group and local media showed the charred remains of bodies on burnt-out truckbeds.

The \$9bn observatory seeks out faint light from the first stars and galaxies, providing a glimpse into cosmic creation

ASA's James Webb Space Telescope, built to give the world its first glimpse of the universe as it existed when the earliest galaxies formed, was launched by rocket early yesterday from the northeastern coast of South America, opening a new era of astronomy.

The revolutionary \$9 billion infrared telescope, described by NASA as the premiere space-science observatory of the next decade, was carried aloft inside the cargo bay of an Ariane 5 rocket that blasted off at about 7:20 a.m. EST (1220 GMT) from the European Space Agency's (ESA) launch base in French Guiana.

The flawless Christmas Day launch, with a countdown conducted in French, was carried live on a joint NASA-ESA webcast. The liftoff capped a project decades in the making, coming to fruition after years of repeated delays and cost over-runs.

"From a tropical rain forest to the edge of time itself, James Webb begins a voyage back to the birth of the universe," a NASA commentator said as the twostage launch vehicle, fitted with double solid-rocket boosters, roared off its launch pad into

## At least 30 dead in migrant boat accidents in Greece

🕇 reek coast guards scoured for survivors in the Aegean Sea vesterday after the latest in a series of migrant boat accidents that have killed at least 30 people in just days.

Late Friday, the coastguard found 16 bodies, including those of three women and a baby, and rescued 63 people from a boat that overturned and sank near the island of Paros.

According to those rescued, around 80 people had been on the vessel that was bound for Italy.

Smugglers operating from Cesme and Bodrum on the Turkish coast are packing migrants in yachts to send them to Italy using new, more dangerous routes, according to the ERT television channel.

Three coast guard patrol boats, private vessels, a coast guard plane as well as divers searched for more survivors, officials said.

The latest tragedy -- the third high smuggler activity not seen north of the Greek island of Anin Greek waters in months.
