'No government jobs for expats' bills rejected

The Shura Council yesterday rejected two bills that sought to amend the Civil Service Law in order to reserve all jobs under the public sector, including contract jobs, for Bahrainis.

The council voted by a majority, with one member abstaining, to reject the two bills following the recommendations of the Legislative and Legal Affairs Committee.

It observed that foreigners need to be hired for jobs in case of not finding a suitable Bahraini candidate who meets the qualifications to occupy the required position.

Russian ultimatum

Putin threatens 'military action' against Ukraine

President Vladimir Putin said yesterday that if NATO does not provide binding guarantees to curtail military deployments in Eastern Europe and to bar Ukraine from membership in the alliance, he will be forced to consider a variety of options, including a military response.

Putin's demands are contained in a pair of draft treaties Russia submitted to NATO earlier this month.

Putin, whose remarks were aired on Russian state TV yesterday, expressed concerns about the possibility of missiles being

"We have nowhere to retreat." Putin said. "They have pushed us to a line that we can't cross. They have taken it to the point where we simply must tell them;

When asked about the exact nature of the response he was proposing, Putin said it would "depend on what proposals our military experts submit to me."

NATO is unlikely to agree to Putin's terms.

"NATO member countries decide who is a member of NATO, not Russia," White House press secretary Jen Psaki told reporters, according to The Washing-

More than 10,000 Russian troops had returned to their bases after a month of drilling on the Ukrainian border. Despite this reduction. Russia still has tens of thousands of troops stationed on the Ukrainian border, and intelligence analysts continue to warn that an invasion could be imminent.

President Biden has threatened increased sanctions if Russia invades Ukraine.
