




AREAS OF CONTROL (Nov 28) Svrian rebel groups Turkish troops and allies

pple Inc said yesterday it would review its software development process a day after a researcher discovered a bug in a new version of its Mac operating system that could give hackers total control of vulnerable machines.

Apple said it released a patch to fix the bug on Wednesday morning and it would be automatically installed on vulnerable machines later in the day.

"We greatly regret this error and we apologize to all Mac users," Apple said in a statement. "Our customers deserve better. We are auditing our development

processes to help prevent this from happening again.

To exploit the bug, a hacker would need to have physical access to a vulnerable Mac when a user is logged on to the computer. The attacker would then need to change settings on the computer to establish a "root" account, which they could later access. Root accounts give users

complete control over a machine. The U.S. and German governments issued alerts advising Mac users to install the patch.

Apple said its security engineers learned of the problem on Tuesday

afternoon and posted the patch within 24 hours.

"Security is a top priority for every Apple product, and regrettably we stumbled with this release of Mac OS," Apple said in its statement.

Apple stock was down 2.6 percent at \$168.55 on Wednesday during a broad selloff in tech stocks.

The behaviour in the Mac operating system that led to the bug's discovery was described by developers on an Apple forum as early as Nov. 13 as a workaround problem accessing for administrator accounts. (Reuters)

UN weighs response as North Korea claims nuclear power status

The UN Security Council faced calls to ratchet up pressure yesterday on North Korea after its groundbreaking missile test, as leader Kim Jong-Un declared his country had completed its drive to become a nuclear power.

US President Donald Trump vowed to respond to Pyongyang's test-firing of an intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) with "major sanctions" following crisis telephone talks with Chinese President Xi Jinping.

Pyongyang on Wednesday tested its third ICBM -- which it claimed was capable of striking anywhere in the United States -- snapping a two-month pause in missile launches.

The council was set to open an emergency meeting at 4:30 pm (2130 GMT) at the request of the United States, Japan and South Korea to weigh a response to the ICBM test, which violates UN resolution.

Ahead of the urgent talks, the White House said Trump urged China to use "all available levers" to press the hermit state.

"Additional major sanctions will be imposed on North Korea today. This situation will be handled!" Trump said on Twitter.

"The ICBM Hwasong-15 type weaponry system is an intercontinental ballistic rocket tipped with super-large heavy warhead which is capable of striking the whole mainland of the US," the North's official news agency KCNA said

North Korean state television brought out Ri Chun-Hee, a star presenter who only appears for significant developments, to announce the landmark. (AFP)
